Assistant Lay Coordinator Report:

A new home.

“For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven” (Ecclesiastes 3:1).

As you may know by now, our “season” as guests of St. Vincent de Paul has come to an end. A number of reasons were given not the least of which was the problem with the septic system backing up at the last women’s weekend. Although we offered solutions for all the cited issues, there was no changing the decision by the couple who run the facility. The result then is Cursillo will no longer hold weekends or any other activity at what has been our home for over the past 10 years.

Finding a new home proved itself to be a challenging endeavor as our options were limited with the downsizing and right sizing of the Diocese. First we had to determine which churches would remain open in the greater Buffalo area; then which had schools or parish centers; of those which did not have an active school or a building being rented to a third party; then which had a large enough and equipped kitchen, spaces for sleeping, dining, palanca, and chapels; from those which could accommodate or have showers; and finally which could work with us to schedule 2 weekends in the spring and 2 in the fall; So, from the 54 potential sites we narrowed it to 12, contacted or visited 9, and finally chose St. Teresa of Avila in Akron as our new home.

In addition to the building at St. Teresa’s having the facilities needed for a weekend, the priest in residence and former pastor, Fr. Art Mattulke, is excited to have us there as can be seen below in the email he sent when we let him know:

*We are so blessed to be able to work with Cursillo! WELCOME HOME!!!
I will talk to Steve (facilities manager) and Margie (religious education director) and see when it will be possible to get your stuff moved in.
I will be in touch.

The facilities manager, Steve Flumerfeldt, is a fellow Cursillista and part of the next men’s weekend team, the religious education director is not only ok with us but shares Fr. Art’s excitement, and finally the Director of Catholic Education for Family 15 is totally on board asking how she can help make Cursillo known in Clarence and Akron.

St. Teresa’s offers us a well-kept and maintained home, a church connected to the school building, classroom space for talks, chapels, and palanca, a separate outside entrance to the good sized and equipped kitchen, plenty of space in the bathrooms for showers which can be left in place, multiple entrances to the building, and ample parking. It’s location in the approximate center of the diocese makes commute time more acceptable from just about anywhere including Lockport and Niagara County.

Change is never easy but as it is written in Philippians 4:6-7:

“Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.”

Throughout this whole process we have been praying for the right place to call home. Our prayers have been wonderfully answered at St. Teresa's.

I would like to thank those who contributed to finding our new home: Diane Putt, Denise Daniels, Otto & Sherry Misso, Mary Bitka, Diane Reese, Mike Emery, Terry Johnson, and the Secretariat for guidance and confidence that a new home could be found.

All we have to do now is make more friends, be a friend, and bring those friends to Christ.

Spiritual Advisor Report:

Historian's Report

“Cursillo, Ecumenism and Koinonia,” Part III

In embracing a new Apostolic Action, the zeal of Cursillistas often impels them to jump in with both feet. Buffalo Cursillo and the Western New York Koinonia Movement became somewhat of an interdenominational group for the next six years. Firstly, both Cursillistas and Koinonians worked Koinonia Weekends. The Koinonia community insisted on incorporating Cursillistas in each team, since they had the necessary knowledge and experience of the of the Cursillo method and movement. Some Koinonians attended Cursillo Ultreyas, monthly Reunion Masses, and Leaders' School. Some Cursillistas were present at monthly Koinonia Prayer Services. It was the Cursillistas' way of supporting their Protestant Brothers and Sisters. In four years, twenty Cursillos and eighteen Koinonia Weekends were held at Bishop Gibbons High School until March, 1979, when the building was sold.

Fr. Pete Szafran, Diocesan Spiritual Director, wrote: “In sharing with fellow clergymen and people of different denominations, I've discovered that we have belief in the same Lord. The sense of community that we strive for is the same for all. Our faith unites us, enables us to support another in the Lord. It has been a very enriching experience for me.” “Buffalo Cursillo Newsletter” May, 1976 (P. 2)

“The WNY Koinonia Movement was planned to be as nearly Cursillo-like as the mixture of Protestant sects and denominational disciplines would allow. Still, emphasis was being directed at developing a Koinonia identity and growth of a “corps of leaders” who would put on their own weekend and carry on their Movement without Cursillistas involved.”

“The basic need for separation of the two movements (the limits of intercommunion) was recognized, but the plan was to keep as much interrelationship as Christians as possible. The ULTIMATE goal was to create a loving, sharing, supporting community of Christians who accepted the apostolate to bring Christ into all places.” Dick Guyette, Koinonia Update, “Buffalo Cursillo Newsletter”, June/July, 1977 (P. 2) The way that WNY Koinonia was somewhat integrated into the Buffalo Cursillo was not that unusual at the time. In the Midwest, it became common for Cursillistas to invite non-Catholics to the 3-day Cursillo “retreat”. This was their way of exercising ecumenism, which led to some problems that non-Catholic participation created, such as intercommunion. Some policies needed to be established.

The National Secretariat was continually monitoring the ecumenical activity in the Movement, because several bishops had requested it. Finally, a definite policy provided uniformity throughout the Movement in the U.S.: “There is to be no ecumenical activity within the Catholic Cursillo Movement. Secretariats, leadership schools, Ultreyas and weekends are to be strictly Catholic.” Leaders' Manual, 1981 (P. 39)

The 1981 Leaders' Manual sought to help correct this amalgamation by stating that "weekends should be strictly Catholic or strictly denominational so they can be true to the teachings and traditions of their own Church bodies." (P. 32)

Protestant offshoots of Cursillo such as Koinonia were encouraged to become denominational for the same reasons. "Experience shows that when they are not, they eventually suffer from lack of clergy support, and become oriented around the weekend experience...they are not really integrated into the life of the church community...for the same reasons, Ultreyas should be denominational." Leaders' Manual, 1981 (P. 32-33) The Leaders' Manual goes on to state "Basically the work of ecumenism is a work of interior renewal within each denomination. Therefore, the best contribution the Cursillo Movement can make to the work of ecumenism is to assist in the work of interior renewal (a) in the Catholic Church and (b) within the other denominations that express an interest in Cursillo... The Movement is at the service of each denomination in terms of its renewal efforts; provided the Movement is used correctly."

"There has been great fruit as the result of renewal taking place within some of the other denominations. We've seen this particularly within the Episcopal Church since there is an established Episcopal Cursillo Movement within that denomination." Leaders' Manual, 1981, (P. 32)

In February 1981, the WNY Episcopal Cursillo Movement was formed separating from the WNY Koinonia Movement. This occurred with the approval of Bishop Harold Robinson of the Episcopal Diocese of Western New York.

To date, this retreat is used by Episcopalian/Anglican Cursillo, Presbyterian Cursillo Pilgrimage, Lutheran Via de Cristo, Mennonite Way of Christ, the United Methodist Church's Walk to Emmaus, various interdenominational communities, and many other renewal movements adapted from Cursillo.
